Call to Order

The Vice-Chair of Senate, Professor Deborah Buszard called the third regular meeting of the Okanagan Senate for the 2017-2018 Academic Year to order at 3:34 pm

By general consent the agenda was amended to move ahead the presentation by the Dean of Medicine to directly follow the remarks by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor.

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Minutes of 26 October 2017

Peter Wylie Jan Cioe That the Minutes of the Meeting of 28 September 2017 be adopted as corrected.

Business Arising from the Minutes

BACHELOR OF ARTS REVIEW

Associate Dean Marianne Legault presented on the recent external review of the Bachelor of Arts program that had been requested by the Provost. She summarized it briefly, noting that the key recommendation from that review was that the BA needed to be modernized. In consideration of that recommendation, the Provost requested that the faculties of Arts & Sciences and Creative & Critical Studies examine how to bring the degree into the 21st century. To that end, a steering committee co-chaired by herself and Dr Bernard Momer has been coordinating a proposal for a revised BA to be brought before the faculties of Arts & Sciences and Creative & Critical Studies by fall of 2019.

Dr Legault advised that this steering committee had completed an environmental scan and has consulted with UBC Vancouver's Faculty of Arts who are going through a similar exercise. We are working to develop learning outcomes and a degree framework. The committee hoped to submit a final report of what a new degree could look like by July 2018. We will be consulting further this year, and then having campus-wide and community stakeholder conversations next spring and fall. We hope to start to propose curricular changes starting in August 2018. If we design a new BA we need to publicize it properly and thus we hope to have a media release in January 2019 for a unique a modern BA.

Senator McNeil noted the timeline, and suggested that our best students were applying now as the deadline is December 1st. January would be a month late for those students.

Dr Legault said she appreciated this but they could not hurry the process.

Senator Cioe asked which committees these proposals would be sent to for Senate approval.

The Acting Secretary, Mr Christopher Eaton, replied the Curriculum Committee, and possibly the Academic Policy Committee and the Admissions & Awards Committee if any general academic requirements or admissions requirements were proposed to be adjusted to coordinate with the new curriculum.

Dr Cioe suggested that consultation could be done more expediently at the senate committees if a more robust consultative process was undertaken by the proponents.

Dr Mathieson said that all of the deans stated that the Arts program and courses were significant to UBC Okanagan and they would like to see broad support for any changes.

Dean Tettey said that they wanted to ensure that the views of the other faculties inform the Bachelor of Arts review.

Remarks from the President

The Vice-Chair noted that a link to the President's video remarks would be circulated to all senators following the meeting and entered into the minutes of Senate as a report.

UNITED STATES UNCERTAINTY

Recently Dr Ono returned from a meeting of the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities in the United States They are in the midst of dealing with uncertainty around both immigration and tax reform. It is clear that universities are a target of tax reforms with one administrator stating that "universities have a target on their back" with both endowments, faculty, and tuition waivers being subject to more taxation. US immigration reform is a challenge to US institutions as there is a Republican-led push to reduce the number of J-visas and permanent residency "Green-cards" along with reducing or even removing the "exceptional ability" provisions in US immigration law. With the Canada 150 chairs program and others, Canadian institutions are in a position to benefit from this uncertainty and there is a considerable interest from top talent both amongst graduate students, and faculty and staff, towards Canada.

STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE.

We have now established working groups that are working intensively and we will update you as their work progresses.

FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION

Dr Ono advised that over the summer there were some challenging events at some American universities where the lines between the principle of freedom of expression vs concerns around hate speech were blurred in a harmful way. A number of faculty members reached out to his office and suggested a dialogue or conversation on Stephen Toope's statement on Freedom of Expression from 2009. Further, there were also a number of flyers distributed across the Vancouver campus and there was a dialogue on if this was offensive or appropriate.

At the encouragement of faculty, Dr Ono advised that he has turned to Neil Guppy, Senior Advisor to the Provosts and Professor of Sociology on Vancouver campus, and convened a group to review that statement. Many of you will be familiar with the University of Chicago's Statement that focused with intensity on academic freedom as one approach a university may take. As a Chicago alumnus, Dr Ono noted that he had been asked why UBC would not use Chicago's statement: simply put, we are not UC, we are UBC. Dr Ono opined that he felt it was important that we have a statement that works in UBC's contexts. At the core, this has to do with both academic freedom and freedom of expression, and both of these are integral to any institution.

Dr Ono suggested that UBC needed to decide on a path forward and that he hoped that those members of the group who developed the most recent draft will continue to be engaged and consider input and revisions to develop a final document that will best serve our institution.

Remarks from the Deputy Vice-Chancellor

Professor Buszard reminded the Senate that there will be another round of consultation on November 30th for the strategic plan. There will be an event for faculty with the president followed by an open house/town hall to welcome input from the campus.

Faculty of Medicine

Dr Buszard welcomed Dean Dermot Kelleher to Senate. She noted the operations of the Faculty of Medicine on the Okanagan campus and the growth in its linkages with the Okanagan and in particular the Faculty of Health & Social Development.

Dean Kelleher framed his presentation with what his Faculty viewed as their contract with society, and emphasized that the Faculty's people were a platform for excellence.

Dean Kelleher described the organization of the Faculty, including:

- 4 academic campuses
- Partnerships with health authorities
- 11 clinical campuses
- 17 affiliated regional centers
- 65 community educational faculties.
- Six institutes and 15 centers.

In consideration of the Faculty's priorities, the dean outlined the following:

- Transformational priorities: Excellence and Equity with Engagement and Effectiveness
- Education: Goal: teaching development and mentoring of practitioners and scientists who can work together effectively in an evolving system.
- Creation of Office of Education Innovation.
- Research Goal: Knowledge creation, translation and exchange to gain insight and promote improved outcomes for patient and public health.

Dean Kelleher described the following research priorities of the Faculty:

- Cancer
- Brain and mental health, Heart and lung health,

• Population health, and chronic disease.

Overarching themes are life science, life course and aging, and prevention and complex disease management.

Of particular relevance to the southern interior, Dean Kelleher highlighted the Reichwald Family UBC Southern Medical Program Chair in Preventative Medicine. Endowed by the Reichwald family, the chair will focus on an academic research program that advances our understanding of chronic diseases and establishes new community-based prevention programs.

With relation to UBC's Okanagan campus, although the Faculty of Medicine was a Vancouver entity, Dean Kelleher stated that there is a real potential for collaboration and alignment between Medicine and the faculties of Health and Social Development and Applied Science.

The Dean then described the faculty's complex organization and partnerships. In terms of partnerships, Medicine is probably the most complex faculty in the world and has the largest number of clinical faculty with nearly 7000. The Faculty is also actively engaged with indigenous communities; a formal advisory council will be established, and the Faculty has set up a working group to explore and develop a faculty response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's call to action. An example of an early success the dean highlighted was the First Nations Health Authority/UBC Cancer Chair.

Finally, Dean Kelleher noted the importance of effective communication to the public on the faculty, its activities, and to that end, the establishment of PATHWAYs magazine.

Senator Cioe thanked the Dean for his presentation and noted the linkages between Medicine and Arts & Sciences, such as the work of Henry Miller. There is an issue with involvement; the Clinical Psychology program is about to be accredited and there was a conversation regarding the involvement of Psychiatry. At that time, we were asked to wait until there were Psychiatry residents in the Okanagan.

Dean Kelleher said that this concern was well founded and that he would look into the matter.

Dr Buszard expressed that she was excited by the possible linkages between health and many other fields at the Okanagan campus.

Update on Freedom of Expression Statement

Dr Buszard noted that a group led by Dr Neil Guppy has been considering a draft statement on freedom of expression and this is bring presented broadly to both Senates and the UBC community for their thoughts and feedback. There is also an opportunity to provide feedback now at Senate or directly to Dr Guppy's group online.

Senator Cioe said that this was an important issue and the difficulty is finding the balance. There have been times when universities have capitulated when they shouldn't have. He stated that yes, there is hate speech but he re-iterated that we shouldn't go too far to have a definition that people being offended for any reason is contrary to policy.

Senator S. Lawrence drew a distinction between academic discussion and polemics.

Dr Buszard opined that if we became a place where difficult topics cannot be discussed than we will have lost our purpose in society.

Senator McNeil noted that we had policies that governed speech of members of our community but we don't have these things for guests that we invite to our campuses. Very often these issues don't come from members of our community but from people invited to our forums. He suggested that the University should apply our own standards to those invited.

Senator Cioe said that respectful environments were culturally determined; noting that he didn't want to be stifled and asked who gives people the right to curtail the rights of others. He suggested that emotional rhetoric was an effective teaching tool. Hate speech was a clear line, but everything up to that edge should be allowed because this is what students will experience in the real world.

Dean Traister said that it can be confusing for visitors who are participating in campus as to what the expectations are for a reasonable academic debate. It is also difficult for students to understand the differences. He suggested that we make these expectations clearer.

Nominating Committee

POLICY 22

Dr Eikenaar advised that the Nominating Committee has considered the referral made at the previous meeting regarding Policy 22 and its applicability for those acting in the roles of or exercising some or all of the powers conferred upon heads of academic units for those faculties without academic units.

The Committee agrees that collegial processes should be used as much as possible in the selection of academic administrators, and is also aware of the variances across both faculties and positions with regards to responsibilities, terms, and other aspects of appointments. Because of that variability, the Committee does not find that a full extension of Policy 22 to all such positions is possible; however, the Committee does agree that abiding by its principles for all such appointments is preferable. Therefore, the Senate Nominating Committee makes the following recommendation to the Vice-President Academic and Research in her capacity as the responsible executive for policy 22 for faculties of the Okanagan campus:

That the Senate Nominating Committee recommend that the procedures as set out in Policy 22 be applied, in so much as is reasonable in each circumstance, for the appointment of all academic administrators in non-departmentalized faculties who exercise some or all of the powers or responsibilities normally assigned to heads in departmentalized faculties under policies, regulations, or other obligations of the University.

Dr Buszard noted that she accepted the Committee's recommendation.

Proposed Award Title: IODE Silver Star Achievement Award

Amended Description:

To commemorate its services and achievements for over 50 years, awards totalling \$1,300 have been endowed by IODE Silver Star for second, third or fourth year students at The University of British Columbia Okanagan. Preference is given to students who have demonstrated academic achievement as well as assessed financial need.

Rationale: University wishes to ease administrative burden.

Proposed Award Title: Sharron Simpson Family Community Impact Awards

The Sharron Simpson Family Community Impact Awards

A gift of \$50,000 from UBC alumna and donor Sharron Simpson to UBC's Okanagan campus will create the Sharron Simpson Family Community Impact Awards program. \$12,500 will be available in each of four years to support awards ranging from \$1,000 to \$2,500. The donor wishes the awards to encourage and enhance real world learning experiences, contribute to a sense of enjoyment and fun in the pursuit of education, and give students an opportunity to make an impact to both the campus and external community.

Goals of the Sharron Simpson Family Community Impact Awards:

- Provide funding to support student led initiatives that link to community service learning;
- Promote student leadership;
- Enhance curricular and extracurricular learning;
- Allow students to pursue a passion

Adjudication

The Sharron Simpson Family Community Impact Awards will be modeled after the UBC Okanagan Tuum Est Student Initiative Fund and adjudicated by the Student Experience Office. The Awards program will have its own visual identity and be housed on the Student Experience website. Students will apply online and be asked to provide information about the initiative, how it meets the criteria for the award, timelines, who their mentors/collaborators are and a budget. Unlike Tuum Est, funding will not be issued on a reimbursement of receipts. Award funding will be advanced upon approval of applications. Applications will be adjudicated a minimum of twice a year. Students will be asked to report back on their experience and this information will be shared with the donor.

Note

International travel and research opportunities will be eligible for consideration by the Sharron Simpson Family Community Impact Awards application process. Requests to attend conferences will not be considered.

Rationale: The donor wishes to clarify what is eligible for consideration.

Proposed Award Title: John Paul Boutin Electrical Engineering Bursary

Amended Description:

Two bursaries of \$1,100 each has been endowed by John Paul Boutin to support a third- and a fourth-year student in the Electrical Engineering Program in the School of Engineering in the Faculty of Applied Science at The University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus. Preference is given to the student with the greatest financial need in each year of study.

New awards for consideration:

a) <u>Proposed Award Title:</u> Gordon and Jean Steele Family Foundation Major Entrance Award

A \$20,000 major entrance award (payable at \$5,000 per year) is offered by the Gordon and Jean Steele Family Foundation to a first-year student entering The University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus. The award will be given to a student who has graduated from a high school in the Thompson-Okanagan or Cariboo regions who demonstrates significant financial need, an exceptional work ethic, as well as academic strength. This award is made on the recommendation of the adjudication committee and is renewable for three years subject to the student maintaining continued scholarship standing. (First award available for the 2018 Winter Session)

b) Award Title: UBC Okanagan Aboriginal Bursary

Existing description (2015): Two bursaries of \$2,500 each are offered to Aboriginal students enrolled at The University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus. Preference is given to students with the greatest financial need.

Proposed Award Title: UBC Okanagan Aboriginal Bursary

Amended Description: Two bursaries of \$2,500 each are offered to Aboriginal students enrolled at the University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus. Preference is given to **third- or fourth-year** students with the greatest financial need.

Rationale: Donor wishes to support later year students

c) Proposed Award Title and Description: International Doctoral Fellowship

The International Doctoral Fellowship (IDF) program supports top international students who are starting UBCO doctoral programs. The fellowship provides funding for a total of four years: a \$25,000 stipend plus tuition for four years from the College of Graduate Studies; also, each recipient's supervisor, department, or Faculty may wish to provide additional funds (top-ups) comprised of awards, teaching assistantships and/or research assistantships in any or all of the four years of the Fellowship. Nominations received from graduate programs will be reviewed and ranked by the College of Graduate Studies (CoGS) Scholarship and Awards Committee.

The Dean of the College of Graduate Studies will approve the recommendations of the CoGS Scholarship and Awards Committee.

The Fellowship is made on the recommendation of the College of Graduate Studies. Approximately four new fellowships will be awarded each year.

ANNUAL VALUE: \$25,000 stipend + tuition

CITIZENSHIP: International

DEGREE LEVEL: Doctoral

Applicant status: Incoming

ELIGIBILITY:

To be eligible, nominees must:

- Hold a valid student visa and be registered full-time when they begin their UBCO doctoral program
- Be starting a UBCO doctoral program in September 2018 (For fast-track students (who advance/ transfer from a master's to a doctoral program without completing their master's degree), the effective date of transfer to the doctoral program must be September 2018)
- Have an admission GPA of first class standing

EVALUATION CRITERIA:

Academic excellence- 30%

- Academic record
- Scholarship and awards held
- Duration of previous studies

Research ability or potential- 50%

- Quality of contributions to research and development
- Relevance of work experience and academic training to field of proposed research

 - o Teaching
 - o Supervisory experience

 - o Organizing conferences and meetings

APPLICATION PROCEDURES

ROUTE A: SUBMITTING NEW APPLICATION FOR PHD ADMISSION

Applicants for admission to the **September 2018 intake**, must meet their proposed graduate program's internal IDF deadline. Deadlines will vary from mid November to mid January; applicants are to contact their proposed graduate program to confirm that program's internal IDF deadline.

Students must complete an International Doctoral Fellowship application by the deadline date specified by their graduate program. Applications must be submitted directly to the graduate program in which the student will be registered. Graduate programs must determine an internal deadline for students in their program. It is important for graduate programs to establish a deadline that will allow sufficient time to provide nominations for the annual College of Graduate Studies deadline of the last Friday in January.

On the basis of the submitted admission application materials, graduate programs will select a maximum of two nominees to the campus-wide IDF competition. Graduate Programs are responsible for submitting the nomination package to the College of Graduate Studies for those nominated to the campus-wide competition. Each nomination must include the IDF application form (posted on the CoGS, IDF webpage). Two reference letters and transcripts from the online admission application plus the IDF application form will comprise the application file to be considered by the Scholarship & Awards Committee.

ROUTE B: FAST-TRACK/ TRANSFER FROM MASTER'S PROGRAM TO PHD PROGRAM (NO ADMISSION APPLICATION)

Master's students who intend to fast-track/ transfer from their Master's program to the PhD program as of **September 2018** must contact their graduate program to indicate their interest in being considered for the IDF competition by their graduate program's internal IDF deadline. **Deadlines vary by graduate program and range from mid November to mid January.** Applicants are to contact their proposed graduate program to confirm that program's internal IDF deadline. Those nominated to the campus-wide competition are required to submit an IDF application form to their Graduate Program (to be posted on the CoGS, IDF webpage). The graduate program will use reference letters from the applicant's previous admission application. The IDF application, two references and all transcripts will comprise the nomination file to be considered by the Scholarship & Awards Committee.

NOMINATION PROCEDURES

Graduate programs will provide a maximum of two nominations for the IDF competition from amongst their applicants for new admission in the PhD program or from fast-track/ transfer from Master's to PhD program for **September 2018**. Graduate programs will select their nominees, assemble the nomination files (see application procedures above) and submit complete nomination files, via email, to the College of Graduate Studies by **4 pm on January 26 2018**.

Please note: the expectation is that graduate programs intend (as best they know at the time of nomination) to make an offer of admission to their incoming IDF nominees; it is not required that an offer of admission has, in fact, been made as of the IDF nomination deadline. Admission timelines vary by graduate program and many graduate programs make their admission offers after the end of January.

A complete nomination file comprises the following:

- **Signed** IDF nomination form
- IDF application form
- Two reference forms
 - o For new PhD admits, will be taken from the admission application
 - o For fast-track/ transfer students from Master's to PhD, taken from the applicant's previous admission application
- All postsecondary transcripts
 - o For new PhD admits, will be taken from admission application
 - For fast-track/ transfer students, will be taken from the admission application. For UBCO/ UBC record, the SISC Academic History can be submitted in place of an official UBC transcript.

Submitting nomination files to the College of Graduate Studies:

Graduate programs will email their nomination files, as a single PDF document for each nomination, to <u>graduateawards.ok@ubc.ca</u> by the last Friday in January every year.

ADJUDICATION PROCEDURES

With a focus on recruitment of incoming doctoral students, International Doctoral Fellowship recipients will be selected through a cross-campus competition from amongst nominations submitted by graduate programs to the College of Graduate Studies in late January. The College of Graduate Studies Scholarship and Awards Committee will adjudicate the fellowship applications. Funding offers will be made in late February / early March.

The Dean of the College of Graduate Studies will approve the recommendations of the CoGS Scholarship and Awards Committee.

CONDITIONS FOR AWARD HOLDERS

Confirmation of Condition of Admission

The IDF will be processed without confirming that the condition of admission was met. However, students are still responsible to meet the condition of their admission by the deadline specified in their offer letter (typically within 12 weeks of starting their program). If the condition of admission is not met, the UBC award will be cancelled, and the student will be required to repay all funds received from the award.

Conditions Pertaining to Satisfactory Progress:

Award holders must maintain satisfactory progress in their program of study and remain registered as a full-time student for each term of the scholarship payment.

Conditions Pertaining to Deferrals:

Students can only defer their International Doctoral Fellowship until January (Winter Term 2) of the same academic year the award was offered.

If they are unable to take up their admission for Winter Term 2, they will not receive the award and it will go to the next recipient from the adjudication process.

However, they are still eligible for nomination by their graduate program for the following September adjudication process if they meet all the criteria.

Conditions Pertaining to a Leave of Absence:

Award holders are not eligible to receive award payments while on approved academic leave from their program. Please advise the College of Graduate Studies to arrange for the suspension of your award payments until your return from on-leave status.

Conditions Pertaining to Transferring to Another Area of Study:

If an award holder "transfers" out of the program that nominated them for the award (i.e. from one department to another), the student may retain the full scholarship payment only if both departments are in agreement.

Conditions Pertaining to Withdrawals:

If an award holder withdraws from the program that nominated them for the fellowship, the funding received during the term for which the withdrawal is processed, will be recovered by the College of Graduate Studies and returned to the nominating program for further allocation.

The Faculty of Creative and Critical Studies is seeking Senate approval to suspend student intake to the Bachelor of Fine Arts, Major in Interdisciplinary Performance for two admission cycles, years commencing in September 2018W and 2019W.

Rationale: We have not been able to attract a large enough cohort to sustain a major. While first year courses are filling up, a small percentage of those students are INTP BFA majors. With so few INTP BFA majors, the student numbers dwindle considerably by the third and fourth years and continuing to offer these courses in the current configuration has become unsustainable.

Enrolment in Theatre programs across the country is in decline and students are taking fine arts courses as ancillary courses to other programs. Our program is no exception. While students are not committing to a BFA with us, many students are taking our classes in tandem with other studies and leveraging their learning across disciplines. The increase of Management, Psychology, History, and Education students in our performance classes is evidence of this.

Our plan is to review our course delivery: We did not anticipate such interest from international students and students from across campus. When designing the program, we focused most of our attention within Creative Studies, hoping to create an interdisciplinary cohort between the three Creative Studies program areas: Performance, Creative Writing, Visual Arts. Because of the requirements of the current Visual Arts BFA degree, we have been unable to attract Visual Arts students to our classes. Creative Writers have been similarly less involved than anticipated. At the same time, upper level courses are less accessible to students from outside our department because of pre-requisites and the nature of these courses for BFA majors. We therefore propose the following two options:

- 1. Create a new program focusing on Applied Theatre. Applied Theatre is a term used to describe the use of live performance practices in contexts other than traditional theatre. It is often done in non-theatrical spaces, with participants who do not consider themselves to be artists/performers. Our program is particularly well suited to this area of study as it is based on devised performance traditions (creating work from within the context), rather than on typical dramatic literature found in theatrical traditions. Such a program can focus on the delivery of performance skills that may be relevant in other academic disciplines. Programs in Management and Human Kinetics have shown interest in the development of such a program and we believe that our program can be adapted to service some of those needs. In addition, performance can be used in conjunction with various community-based research strategies to address concrete, contemporary social and environmental issues/problems that might be useful for other Health or Social Science related research and possible CBR course based development.
- 2. Explore how to integrate performance as a media area within the BFA's Major in Visual Arts.

Reconfigure existing courses in the performance program to compliment better other media areas of photography, drawing, painting, sculpture and digital media within Visual Arts. This will allow students who wish to study performance from a fine arts perspective to continue to develop their artistic skills towards professional outcomes. Performance art has a strong presence within the visual arts and our current program has always been partially integrated with the VISA program. Some of the existing courses in the INTP BFA will be repurposed to emphasize Performance art and/or intersections between Performance and Visual Art so, that they can be better integrated into the VISA program.

Rationale: Combustion of fossil fuels is the primary source of energy conversion in Canada and worldwide. Several industries related to aerospace engineering, e.g., aircraft engines, rely on design and development of equipment that are involved with combustion processes. There are two rationales for proposal of this course. First, there is immediate industrial need for design of aircraft engines that are environmentally-friendly and rely on sustainable fuel sources. This course will allow the students to gain the necessary knowledge related to combustion science, which will facilitate their integration with the aerospace industry. Second, combustion is a multidisciplinary subject, and, as a result, knowledge from several areas including thermodynamics, fluid mechanics, heat transfer, and engineering mathematics is utilized in combustion. This course provides a unique opportunity for students to practice how understanding related to several areas of engineering and science can be integrated in order to understand/design engineering equipment.
